Educating Children and Youth in Homeless Situations: Laws, Policies, and How They Work in Real Life

This preconference is designed for people who are new to homeless education, or who would like a refresher. We will provide an in-depth explanation of Subtitle VII-B of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Topics will cover eligibility, the role of liaisons, school selection, transportation, immediate enrollment, disputes, preschool, and unaccompanied youth. Other laws, such as Title I, IDEA, Higher Education, and Head Start also will be reviewed. Then, we will use this information to walk through real-life problems, step by step. Presenters will offer concrete strategies for implementing the law in school districts.

Professional Ethics in Action when Working with Runaway and Homeless Youth

Participants will be able to identify self-knowledge and understanding of ethical dilemmas and their resolution, and will learn to apply an ethical decision-making model to specific ethical dilemmas when working with these youth populations. Help! I Don't Speak Housing!

Wouldn't you like to help end homelessness? Our families need housing, but what kind? Permanent or transitional? Affordable, subsidized, or supportive? And through what program? Section 8, HOME, or public housing? What do these mean, and how can our vulnerable families access programs? This session will look at research demonstrating the importance of stable, long-term housing for children and youth and provide a basic framework for understanding terminology, options, and eligibility criteria for housing assistance programs.

Rural Reality: Understanding Homelessness Outside of an Urban Setting

A common barrier found in rural areas is the misperception that "we don't have children experiencing homelessness here." The session will focus on a regional approach to identifying and serving children and youth experiencing homelessness in 10 counties in Northwestern Pennsylvania, including an overview of the issues and a discussion of the unique barriers which face rural populations. Urban and rural poverty will be compared and contrasted, and current research, statistics, and trends will be reviewed. Participants will be given a "toolkit" of forms and other materials that can be used and adapted for use in other programs.

Participants are invited to a presentation and discussion about how this model is working in Albuquerque and how it might be adapted for other communities.
