EXTRINSIC CRITICISM – Key Questions to Ask and Answer

Historical, Post-Colonial, Cultural Studies

- How does the author's biography influence his/her work?
- How does the history surrounding the work influence it?
- How has the *culture* surrounding the writer influenced the work?
- How does the writing surrounding the work influence that work?
- How does the ideology of imperialism, including the practice of race, influence the work?

You'll be given a sample essay based on this story.

<u>Psychological Criticism</u>

- How do various complexes (Oedipal, for example) manifest themselves in the work?
- How does the writer or a character in the work manifest various "defense mechanisms"?
- ---Isolation: What is author or character (hereafter, "A/C") not feeling that they should?
- ---Intellectualization: How is A/C escaping feelings by intellectualizing them?
- ---Repression: What is A/C ignoring?
- ---Projection: How is A/C disguising a feeling by putting it onto something/someone else?
- ---Displacement: How is A/C downplaying a feeling, usually by blaming him/herself?
- ---Denial: How does A/C deny what he or she knows or feels?
- ---Reversal: How does A/C turn around a thought or feeling, usually so he/she blames himself?
- ---Reaction Formation: How does A/C **convince him/herself** that what's happening is the opposite of what's actually happening?

- What role does sex and gender play in the work?
- What would happen to the work if the gender of main characters were changed?
- What image of women is conveyed in the work?
- How is the relationship between men and women depicted?
